PAST COMMANDER BARRY K. BLOUNT AWARDED "VETERAN OF THE YEAR"

Pelham's Barry Blount was honored with the Veteran of the Year Award by the National Veterans Day Foundation on Wednesday, November 10, 2021 at the Birmingham National Veterans Day Awards Dinner held at the Sheraton Downtown Birmingham. Barry was surrounded by his family, close friends, and fellow Legionnaires from The American Legion Matthew Blount Post 555, who beamed with pride and love as Barry crossed the room to receive his well-deserved award.

Barry was presented with a plaque signed by Governor Ivey, and was draped with a hand-made "Quilt of Honor", both very prestigious awards. His son, A.J., said that receiving this award was a "huge accomplishment" for his father after his years of hard work and dedication. "My family is known for service to our country and community, so this award will be held dear to my father," A.J. said. "We are extremely proud of him in everything he does knowing that he will always put God and Country first."

On a day where most people would be soaking up the spotlight, Barry spent the evening instead praising those who have supported him and worked with him throughout his career. He said his whole life he has purposefully surrounded himself with strong people in the community. "This award tonight is not about me," he said. "It is about the people who surround me and got me here." Throughout the evening, Barry praised the hard work and determination of his son, Matthew. As he spoke of his son's continued dedication to service even through his cancer diagnosis, Barry became emotional.



Barry served in the United States military for 28 years and since his retirement in 2005, he has thrown himself into his work representing Veterans and those in his community.

In 2014, he began The American Legion Matthew Blount Post 555. Every year the Post holds a Memorial Ride from Pelham to the Alabama National Cemetery in Montevallo in honor of his son, Matthew, who died of cancer in 2012 and is interred as an honored Veteran. In turn, the Post sponsors local Boy Scout Troop 404, and through their Junior Shooting Program, provides scholarship opportunities to America's youth. The shooting program keeps record of the students' marksman scores so when the time comes to apply to universities that have programs of their own, they will be able to submit their scores for scholarship consideration. "It is only through The American Legion that they can get involved in this scholarship opportunity, and we totally encourage those kids to come through the Civilian Marksmanship Program," Barry said.

All of us who were present to witness Barry receiving this award that evening, were proud to be there to share in his special time as the Veteran of the Year. Post 555 was very well-represented by four tables of fellow Legionnaires and guests with a standing ovation as Barry walked to the center of the room where he was handed his plaque, and draped with a "Quilt of Honor". I think all of you will agree that Barry is someone who cares deeply for his family, friends, Veterans, fellow Legionnaires, and the community he proudly serves. Please congratulate Barry for being selected as the Veteran of the Year.



Here is how we are doing with our membership numbers: As of today's report, we have 158 members paid through 2022 (including the 11 PUFL members), and 71 paid through 2021 (in other words, these members have not renewed as of yet). These are my "target" members!!! There are also 19 members who are paid through 2019 and 28 members who are paid through 2020. ALL of these members can be contacted to return to us even though their "continuous years" will start back at "1" which is a terrible shame for them. Hopefully we can convince them to come back to Post 555.

So far this year, we have been doing very well with the requirements that the Alabama Department set for us:

September 15, 2021's goal was to have 50% of our goal of 218; we had exactly 50% (109), even without the PUFL members that were left off for some reason.

September 21, 2021's goal was to have 55% of our goal of 218; we were at 55.5% which DID include the PUFL members, so we were good-to-go

November 3, 2021's goal was to have 65% of our goal of 218; we had 65.14% (142) so we met the

December 3, 2021's goal is to have 75% of our goal of 218 which would be 164 members paid through 2022; as of today we have 158, so we need six more to meet our goal.

Everyone should have received their notification from The American Legion asking for your dues for 2022, so please make sure you take care of that as soon as you can. One reason for doing it now will prevent you from continuing to receive more notifications and mistakenly paying duplicate times. I have heard some members tell me that they are going to wait until the end of 2021 to pay their 2022 dues, but I try to explain to them that the State Department puts requirements out that have certain percentages that need to be met at certain times of the year, so the earlier we get our 2022 dues in, the better we will do in meeting these requirements. Make your check payable to Matthew Blount Post 555 and put it along with the "Dues Notice" in an envelope and mail to the Post address which For God and Country is 50 Racquet Club Parkway, Pelham, AL 35124. Ron Koonce will get them out of the mailbox at the Pelham Senior Center, deposit your check, and send me a copy of the "Dues Notice" for me to update your membership in MyLegion.org as a 2022 paid member! I will then send

your 2022 membership card via USPS along with a nice letter thanking you for your Service and continued support of Post 555. I cannot wait to send you my nice "thank you" letter and your 2022 membership card with my signature on it; that is the best part of my job as Adjutant; taking care of YOU!!!

If you prefer paying with a credit/debit card, please go to legion.org and join on-line. I check that report almost on a daily basis, so I would LOVE to see your on-line renewal if you like renewing from the comfort of your own home.

Do not get behind on your membership since that would affect the loss of your benefits. If you pay your 2022 dues after 12/31/21, your membership will have expired, so don't take a chance that you might forget and lose your valuable benefits. Everyone is important to the Post even if you cannot participate in meetings or events. We still want you to stay on our rolls as an honored member of Post 555.

If you are a current R.S.V.P. (Retired Senior Volunteer Program) member, don't forget to report your volunteer hours for the month of November when you come to the December 2, 2021 Post 555 meeting. I submit the hours by the 10th of the next month. If you are not yet an R.S.V.P. member, the only criteria is that you are age 55+ years young. You need to complete an application and supply a copy of the front of your driver's license (proof of age). There is a copier at the Senior Center that I can use to make a copy of your driver's license for you. Every month you will record your volunteer hours anywhere you serve, including Post 555 meetings and events. Just let me know if you would like an application!!

Our current R.S.V.P. members will be honored at the December 2, 2021 Annual Volunteer Recognition Christmas Brunch at the Pelham Civic Complex at 9:00 a.m. that morning. We have a full table of eight attending to ensure that Post 555 is well-represented. If there are any "goodies" distributed for those of you who could not attend, I will be sure to get them to you.

SERVICE OFFICER NOTES

VA's tobacco cessation programs can help – anywhere, anytime.

VA has a range of treatment options for all Veterans who wish to quit smoking, available through all VA medical centers and community-based outpatient clinics. You may call, text, have an in-person appointment or have a telehealth visit with a provider for smoking cessation counseling.

A combination of treatments will increase your chance of quitting for good. Your provider may recommend combining counseling with FDA-approved prescription medications or nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) products. Those products may include gum, patches and lozenges that can help you transition away from smoking.

Treatment options

• In-person counseling: Tobacco cessation counseling offers Veterans the best chance of becoming and staying smoke-free when combined with another cessation tool, such as medication or NRT products. VA offers group and individual counseling to talk about smoking, triggers and lifestyle changes that can help you overcome the urge to smoke. Cessation counseling is routinely provided through VA medical centers and community-based outpatient clinics.

Remote counseling: VA offers secure virtual appointments that you may attend from your home or another place of your choosing. Remote monitoring devices and tools – such as <u>VA Video Connect</u>, VA's secure videoconferencing app – help bring your providers closer to you.

Medications and NRT: VA offers FDA-approved

prescription medications as well as NRT to help relieve nicotine withdrawal symptoms and the cravings that come with quitting smoking. Your VA provider can guide you through the available options and help you decide which one might work best for you.

- Quit VET: Veterans can call 1-855-QUIT-VET (1-855-784-8838) to receive tobacco cessation counseling and get help building their plan to quit smoking. Quitline counselors are available Monday through Friday, between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m. ET. Counselors can help you prepare for potential challenges and avoid relapse. They also offer continued support through follow-up calls and counseling. Counseling is available in English or Spanish.
- SmokefreeVET: For tools and tips you can use to quit smoking, sign up for SmokefreeVET by texting VET to 47848. SmokefreeVET provides regular text messages as well as extra support for Veterans. Text the keywords URGE, STRESS or SMOKED to 47848.

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HISTORY OF VETERANS DAY

World War I – known at the time as "The Great War" - officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

The original concept for the celebration was for a day observed with parades and public meetings and a brief suspension of business beginning at 11:00 a.m.

The United States Congress officially recognized the end of World War I when it passed a concurrent resolution on

June 4, 1926, with these words:

Whereas the 11th of November 1918, marked the cessation of the most destructive, sanguinary, and far reaching war in human annals and the resumption by the people of the United States of peaceful relations with other nations, which we hope may never again be severed, and

Whereas it is fitting that the recurring anniversary of this date should be commemorated with thanksgiving and prayer and exercises designed to perpetuate peace through good will and mutual understanding between nations; and

Whereas the legislatures of twenty-seven of our States have already declared November 11 to be a legal holiday: Therefore be it Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives concurring), that the President of the United States is requested to issue a proclamation calling upon the officials to display the flag of the United States on all Government buildings on November 11 and inviting the people of the United States to observe the day in schools and churches, or other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies of friendly relations with all other peoples.

An Act (52 Stat. 351; 5 U. S. Code, Sec. 87a) approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday—a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day." Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor Veterans of World War I, but in 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of Soldiers, Sailors, Marines and Airmen in the Nation's history; after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of the Veterans service organizations, amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation (Public Law 380) on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American Veterans of all wars.

Later that same year, on October 8th, President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued the first "Veterans Day Proclamation" which stated: "In order to insure proper and widespread observance of this anniversary, all Veterans, all Veterans' organizations, and the entire citizenry will wish to join hands in the common purpose. Toward this end, I am designating the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs as Chairman of a Veterans Day National Committee, which shall include such other persons as the Chairman may select, and which will coordinate at the national level necessary

planning for the observance. I am also requesting the heads the heads of all departments and agencies of the Executive branch of the Government to assist the National Committee in every way possible."

On that same day, President Eisenhower sent a letter to the Honorable Harvey V. Higley, Administrator of Veterans' Affairs (VA), designating him as Chairman of the Veterans Day National Committee.

In 1958, the White House advised VA's General Counsel that the 1954 designation of the VA Administrator as Chairman of the Veterans Day National Committee applied to all subsequent VA Administrators. Since March 1989 when VA was elevated to a cabinet level department, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs has served as the committee's chairman.

The Uniform Holiday Bill (Public Law 90-363 (82 Stat. 250)) was signed on June 28, 1968, and was intended to ensure three-day weekends for Federal employees by cele-

brating four national holidays on Mondays: Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Columbus Day. It was thought that these extended weekends would encourage travel, recreational and cultural activities and stimulate greater industrial and commercial production. Many states did not agree with this decision and continued to celebrate the holidays on their original dates.

The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed with much confusion on October 25, 1971. It was quite apparent that the commemoration of this day was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of our citizens, and so on September 20th, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed Public Law 94-97 (89 Stat. 479), which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of November 11, beginning in 1978. This action supported the desires of the overwhelming majority of state legislatures, all major Veterans service organizations and the American people.

Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans Day to November 11 not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: A celebration to honor America's Veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.
